Bees and Nature

I was experimenting with painting and writing on Japanese and handmade paper. The

background is Japanese paper with text written with a mix of Winsor Newton Gouache and Daler Rowney white liquid acrylic ink with a ¾ mm Hiro nib.

Free Form Florals

Very quickly done, loose "essence" florals with Winsor Newton and Lucas watercolors, #3h graphite pencil and text done with 1/2mm Hiro

nib using white Winsor Newton Gouache on Arches 140 lb cold press paper.





Thank You Greeting Card

Over the years I have done a series of greeting cards both in "one of a kind" as well as for print.

This sample is done on a blank Strathmore watercolor with florals painted with Daniel Smith and Winsor Newton watercolor, ½" flat watercolor brush.

Poppies

This piece was done on Arches 140 lb Hot Press watercolor paper. It was based on a class I was offering combing my "Very Free Versals" along with loose watercolor poppies. I have loved poppies ever since they were a prominent part of my mother's gardens on our farm in Southern Alberta, Canada where I grew up.





Hollyhocks

Another piece reflective of my growing up years when I would visit my great-grandmother's garden. Although her garden was small, it was filled with glorious blooms of all kinds. I remember the Hollyhocks being taller than I was as I wound my way through the tight pathways between the flowers. I can still smell the flowers.

Strathmore watercolor paper, **Daniel Smith and Winsor Newton** watercolors, ½" flat watercolor brush

Text: Winsor Newton Gouache with Hiro 1/2mm nib

I then sealed the paper with a medium then affixed it to a canvas. The bees were drawn and painted on the Japanese paper then cut out and affixed to the piece. Circle portion done on St Armand handmade paper with florals painted with Winsor Newton and Daniel Smith watercolor. Gold text written in Schminke gold gouache. Outside border text in graphite and Micron Pigma liner, size 01.

Nature Will Help Us

Many have done COVID pieces and I did this one in moment of knowing that we would get through that difficult time. I had been doing some work on unbleached muslin fabric and did this little piece with Daniel Smith watercolors 1/2" flat watercolor brush. The text was written out in Sumi ink with a 1/2mm Hiro nib.

I do my best to fill empty, often unused, spaces (like the back of invitation cards) with patterns and colors.

Rachel's Work Process

Rachel likes to paint large repeating patterns of flowers, vines, and other subjects for her invitation designs. She can then scan different parts of the pattern or an entire repeating pattern for the back of the

invitation and envelope liners. She prints wallpaper and fabric from her designs.

Rachel prefers painting by hand rather than painting in Procreate, although she sometimes tweaks her work in Procreate to save time. "I can add a little leaf here and there, add more

definition to parts of the painting, then save it and take it back to Photoshop or Illustrator."

After she receives the design brief from a client, she likes to let ideas percolate for a while. "I work pretty quickly, so for a typical invitation suite it takes me about six to ten hours total time to paint and put the designs together. But my contract allows for eight to ten weeks of design and production time, so I have plenty to time to think about the design before I start it."

"I use Procreate to do some quick thumbnails with the general outline and color palette to show the client what I'm thinking. After receiving their feedback, I devote my time to the artwork and calligraphy. If there are any edits it's usually minor text things." Rachel


handles the printing of the invitations and paper goods herself, using her favorite local printer.

For a recent order of 24 table signs, she used Procreate to assemble scans of her hand-painted flowers and numbers and had them printed by her printer. She's pretty fast at painting by hand, but for 24 signs it was faster to take advantage of technology to get the job done.

For another table signs order, the wedding theme was Mexican-Chinese fusion. They wanted to do signs that were a combination of loteria cards and mahjong tiles. "I drew a line drawing for each illustration, scanned them, then sent them to my laser cutting vendor to cut out of wood." Rachel then used watered-



down gouache to hand paint all the wood signs. The results are fabulous!

Clients like to use these type of signs for Christmas ornaments or to frame for display. "Whenever I have something laser-engraved, whether it's wood or acrylic, I like to add handpainted details to it to warm it up."

One recent table sign project involved painted venue illustrations, with a different venue design for each table. The price for these amazing signs was about \$45-55 each. "They are labor intensive, but a lot of fun." Her next big table sign project is designing and painting 30 music venues from around the country.

Onsite Paintings

Rachel offers onsite painting at weddings, where she paints a scene while the guests are allowed to watch. It offers an extra layer of fun for the guests, and a unique memento for the married couple.

Most of her paintings are 18" x 24". When she first offered this service, clients wanted larger paintings but this ended up being too much. "This size is in that sweet spot but is still pretty large."

Rachel arrives at the venue a few hours early and takes photos of the reception area from different angles. She then decides which position she likes best, then gets to work sketching and painting the room, using her iPad to show the photos. She works in acrylic paints since they dry fast.

After the couple arrives, Rachel videos their first dance than goes through the video looking for still shots that will work for the couples' pose. She then paints them in the picture. "People love watching the painting transform. In the beginning phase it's kind of ugly. But later they'll walk by and it's fun to see their faces as they watch the painting come together."

The entire process takes about six hours from arrival to finished painting. She usually almost finishes the painting by the end of the reception, then takes it back to her studio for finishing touches. "I like to look at the painting in natural light and make minor tweaks to the details. The big challenge is that the light changes from dinner, to the first dance, to everyone dancing, and you have purple, blue, and green lights going on. So you have to make a conscious decision at the beginning of what colors you are going to use and stick with them throughout all the lighting changes."

Rachel accepts about six to eight onsite painting events per year. "It's super fun but it's a ton of work and very involved." &
